Read further for information about the upcoming bus trip, annual blessing of the boats and the club's annual picnic.

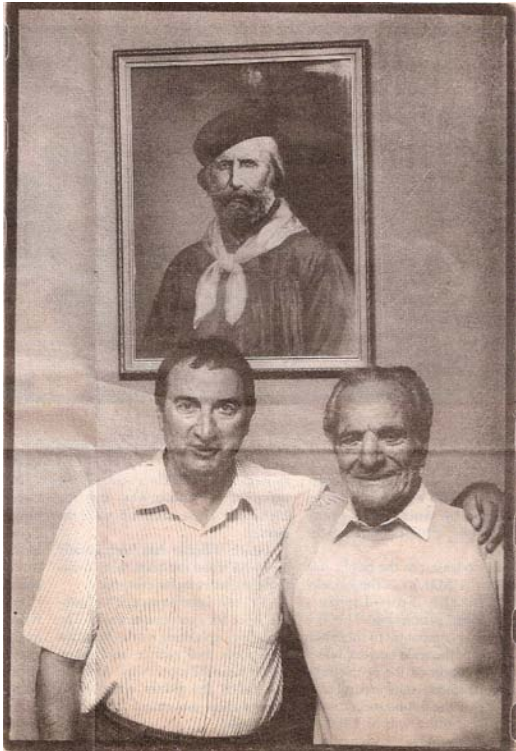

TO THE ENDS OF THE EARTH

Note: This article is from the now defunct City Voice publication. It featured in 1995, as the article suggests, immediately before the Italian Festival held on 1 March of that year on the Petone foreshore. I think the Club moved the festival to the Overseas Terminal the following year, where we stayed until 2009!

Italians in Wellington have a lot of celebrating to do this week. An exhibition, a book launch, and an Italian Festival are all on the agenda.

All three events based at the Settlers Museum in Petone offer a rare insight into the origins of one of the capital's larger minorities.

The first distinct migration from Italy to Wellington came first from northern Italy in the early 1880s, followed early this century by people from Stromboli in the south. The Strombolesi now make up a large proportion of the Italians living in Island Bay, and have always been associated with fishing, fish retailing and restaurants.

One of the benefits of 'chain migration' – migrants following an established route over many years – is that new arrivals have a circle of friends and family waiting at the end of the journey. Word of mouth was the chief method of enticing Italians to New Zealand. Those who returned to Italy spread the news about good fishing, and at one point gold (the Garibaldi Diggings in Southland).

Evening Post assistant editor Paul Elenio, author of 'Alla Fine Del Mondo' ('To the end of the Earth'), says that Italians were given no encouragement to come here except by Premier Julius Vogel who sought foreigners to make the country grow.

While many immigrants in official programmes were unsuited to the jobs that awaited them, when left to their own devices they fared much better in fishing and in market gardening. Another successful scheme was the terrazzo industry, building terraces and tiling houses.

During the Second World War, 39 Italians were classified as 'enemy aliens' and held on Somes Island for four years. While their incarceration was not particularly arduous, the families suffered as a result of this wartime paranoia. Fishermen, however, were left to carry on, as they produced an essential commodity; they were transplanted from Eastbourne to Island Bay.

The Garibaldi Club was set up in 1882 as a centre for 'sons of a newly unified Italy'. It is still a place where men, and lately women, of Italian descent can meet, dance, dine, bowl and play cards, not to mention speak Italian. Recently its first female secretary, Nina Cuccurullo, was appointed. The club boasts nearly 300 members.

Paul Elenio finds that, by the third generation of Italian New Zealanders, the youth is Italian in name only. A great interest remains however, in their background, and activities such as dance and language help keep their heritage secure.

It is not uncommon for an Italian man in NZ to return to Italy to take a bride and quickly start a family. Then he would commence a to-ing and fro-ing between the two countries, building up the family until they could all be brought to the new country. This sometimes took 20 years!

An exhibition celebrating the history of the Italian settlers in Wellington and the Hutt Valley opened at the Petone Settlers Museum yesterday (1 March).

The Garibaldi Club, in association with the Settlers Museum and the Hutt City Council, will hold a festival on the Petone foreshore this Sunday (5 March) from 1pm to 4pm), wet or fine. Historic videos will be shown at the museum, the Italian choir and tarantella dance group will perform, and Italian wine and food will be offered. All welcome!

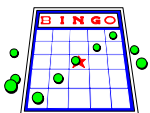

WORLD'S OLDEST CROCODILE SKELETON TURNS UP IN BOLOGNA
ANSA – Bologna – 10 November 2010

A crocodile fossil in a northern Italian museum has turned out to be the oldest in the world, Italian scientists said. The skull found in a block of rock during motorway construction near Verona in the 1950's, has been in Bologna's University geological museum since the 1960's. It has now been dated to some 165 million years ago, making it the oldest crocodile remains in the world, according to Bologna palaeontologists Federico Fanti and Andrea Cau.

'A few years ago I said to Andrea, why don't we try to find out more about this beast' Fanti said. Crocodiles have not changed a lot from ancient times but the really old guys have wider jaw. The cheekbones on this one were huge which made us think it was a lot older'.

Tests showed that the animal was some 10 million years older than first thought. The animal lived on the coast of what was at that time North Africa, on the northern shores of the vast ancient land mass known as Gondwana, the scientists added.

ANNUAL BLESSING OF THE BOATS

Island Bay – traditionally a fishing strong-hold in Wellington – will once again, host the annual Blessing of the Boats during the Island Bay Festival on **Sunday, 13 February 2011** at 2.30 to 3.30 pm.

The following is a short history of its origins. The blessing of fishing boats is a tradition in Italy that goes back centuries. In southern Italy, the blessing would be undertaken by the local priest at the start of spring. The boats, many of which were named after saints, were decorated with flags and bunting, would file past to have holy water sprinkled on them while the priest recited prayers and made the sign of the cross. The blessing was part of the religious belief that if the boats received the grace of God, they and the fishermen would be protected from the elements and would also reap the bounty of the sea. Many of Island Bay's Italian immigrants came from the fishing villages of Massalubrense and Puolo in the Gulf of Naples, and the island of Stromboli, near Sicily. Today all sea craft and vessels are welcome to take part in this special ceremony.
