Note from the President

We also discussed the financial position of the Club, and at present due to the middle floor still being vacant, the Club needs to control its expenditure.

These benefits are largely funded by renting the ground and first floor premises and the car parks and, of these, the first floor which has been vacant for some time, provides the greatest return. Radio Cartolina Programme for November

2 November: Flutist Luca Manghi presents the compilation titled "Quays", recorded with pianist David Kelly and Horomoana Horo, playing traditional Maori instruments. It's all contemporary pieces exploring new resonance, like Tre

Canzoni Imperfette by Michael Norris (commissioned by Luca himself), and Hineraukatauri (the Maori Goddess of music and dance) by Gillian Whitehead. The CD is published by Atoll.

16 November: The first programme of two, dedicated to Umberto Eco, an Italian novelist, medievalist, semiotician, philosopher, and literary critic, who died on the 19th of February 2016. Many of you have read books like The Name of the Rose, Foucault's Pendulum, and The Island of the Day Before. To pay homage to the man and to his legacy, I invited Marco Sonzogni, professor of Italian language and literature at Victoria University in Wellington. He is obviously well acquainted with Eco's work in the arcane field of semiotics, and all of his literary production. Also Marco had known Eco for many years, and had with Eco a steady exchange of views. This is Marco's testimony, accompanied by music by Nino Rota, recorded by Francesco D'Orazio and Giampaolo Nuti: The Legend of the Glass Mountain, and A Sentimental Devil.

30 November: "La pancia tra le parentesi delle bretelle – benevolo Caronte sulla navicella dell'ingegno". These are two lines from the poem written by Marco Sonzogni on Umberto Eco, the Italian novelist, medievalist, semiotician, philosopher, and literary critic, who died on the 19th of February 2016. Marco is a professor of Italian language and literature at Victoria University, and in this program (the second dedicated to Eco) he reads the poem, and recalls some funny moments shared with Eco, whom he visited at home regularly for many years. We play Ennio Morricone's music from C'era una volta il West, and The Mission.

Radio Cartolina is the radio programme *"For those who remember Italy and who dream of it"*. It's being produced since 1999 under the patronage of Societa Dante Alighieri Christchurch, and is aired locally through Community radio Plains fm 96.9.

Donation of Giuseppe Garibaldi Statue

A few months ago I visited 20th Century Antiques and Collectables in Lower Hutt and was surprised to see a statue of Giuseppe Garibaldi!The owners of this shop Maria and Geoff Alberino-Pratt have an Italian connection with Maria being the daughter of Mario Alberino whose family was from the Isle of Capri, Italy Thank you to Maria (pictured in her shop) and Geoff for the donation of the statue which is now proudly displayed in the clubrooms.

Below is an extract from the book *Alla Fine Del Mondo* in which Paul Elenio writes about our Club's namesake.

Club Garibaldi is named after the great Italian patriot, Giuseppe Garibaldi, whose military leadership was crucial to the unification of Italy after centuries of foreign domination and provincial rivalry and warfare. Giuseppe Garibaldi was born in Nice, France, and, like his father, became a sailor. In 1833 he joined La Giovane Italia (Young Italy), an organisation dedicated to making Italy a unified, independent nation. After a planned uprising in Genoa was unsuccessful, he fled Italy and went to South America. He spent 14 years in exile in South America, where he formed his first army of "Redshirts" and gained fame as a revolutionary commander, fighting for independence movements.

Garibaldi returned to Italy in 1848 and formed the Italian Legion to help fight for independence. In 1849 they tried in vain to defend the newly formed Roman Republic against French troops. After resisting a two-month siege, Garibaldi was forced to retreat from Rome and, once again, fled from Italy. This time Garibaldi did not stay away for long, returning in 1854.

He was invited by Cavour to help the Kingdom of Piedmont defeat the Austrians in northern Italy and in 1859 led a guerilla force against the Austrians around Lake Como. His most famous action was leading his "Redshirts" to capture Sicily and Naples in the name of a united Italy. Sailing from Genoa in May 1860, they landed in Sicily and from there, went on to conquer Naples in what became known as the "March of a Thousand." He handed his conquests over to Victor Emmanuel II, King of Piedmont, who became King of Italy. The army of "Redshirts" was disbanded.

Apart from two abortive attempts to capture the Papal States, Garibaldi spent the the rest of his life in retirement on the island of Caprera off the coast of Sardinia. Although Garibaldi was a popular hero, he was not particularly liked by the government. His republican views were well known, and the armies he gathered together were regarded as undisciplined, and thought to contain many radicals and criminals. He died at Caprera on June 2, 1882.

The following month in Wellington, a group of Italians met to form our club which was named in his honour. The founders of the club included several followers of Garibaldi who had been exiled by the King to New Zealand, "to the ends of the earth", because of their political leanings.
