## **WELCOME TO DON MARINKO ANTOLOVIC - APOSTOLIC NUNCIO, WELLINGTON**

In Don Marinko's own words:



I was born on 27 January 1976 in Zenica - Bosnia and Hercegovina. My parents are still, thank God, living and reside in Zenica. I have also one, older brother, who is married and has two children.

I began my theology studies in 1994 in and finished in 2000 in Sarajevo - Bosnia and Herzegovina, when I was also ordained as a priest.

Following my ordination I became an assistant priest for one year in a Bosnian parish. In 2001 I was sent to Rome to study for my Phd in Scripture and completed my licence in Scripture in 2005 at the Pontifical Biblical Institute in Rome. That same year I entered the Pontifical Ecclesiastical Academy.

In 2008 I completed my Phd in Biblical Theology at the Pontifical University of Urbaniana in Rome, and also my preparation at the Academy, after which I was assigned to the Apostolic Nunciature in New Zealand, as the Attache of the Nunciature. This position is the first post in my diplomatic service to the Holy See and to the Church. I arrived in Wellington on 7 August.

You may ask, how long will I be staying in New Zealand? Hmmmm! Let's leave that to God's Providence to decide! He will know the best moment for me to leave this beautiful country and move somewhere else.

## **A BIT OF TRIVIA**

ANSA - Reggio Emilia, August 21

A new ice-cream flavoured with Italy's king of cheeses, Parmigiano Reggiano, is proving a smash hit in China, its inventors said. Italo-Chinese ice-cream company La Perla said people were snapping up the creation, which is made with authentic Italian parmesan cheese, in Beijing and Shanghai. 'The taste was immediately excellent, but the biggest problem was getting the consistency right' said La Perla director Roberto Longoni. 'The secret was to choose an 18-month-old cheese, which is sweeter and more elastic. It is an ice-cream made entirely by hand, in the same way we traditionally make our cheese'. La Perla offers over 400 other flavours of hand-made Italian ice-cream in addition to the parmesan flavour.

As I enter my fourth year as President of Club Garibaldi, it gives me great pleasure to advise members that our club continues to thrive. I would like to take this opportunity to sincerely thank all those who have encouraged and supported me during the years. May our achievements keep on this path in future years.

We have enjoyed another happy and eventful year, during which time the number of members who frequented club activities and functions has risen. As at the end of our financial year in June 2008, membership stood at its highest ever with 400 members! As I have stated before, it is truly remarkable that Club Garibaldi continues to prosper and move from strength to strength, in such a busy 'outside' world, which is filled with so many other activities. This proves that there is still a place for cultural clubs such as ours, in our society.

In addition to the monthly Italian Masses, bi-monthly shared lunches and tombola evenings which have been well attended, the following are some of the year's highlights: The beginning of the 2007-08 year began with our soccer team's fund-raiser dinner in August, where 91 people enjoyed a four course dinner catered by La Bella Italia at Ristorante Garibaldi. In September 126 members joined together to celebrate the club's milestone 125<sup>th</sup> anniversary with a fantastic celebration dinner and dance ~ Club Garibaldi can lay claim to be the world's oldest Italian social club outside of Italy! The month of October saw our soccer team successfully challenge Club Italia Nelson for the Aldo Cucurullo Memorial Trophy for the third year in a row! Congratulations guys! Once again, you did us proud!

On Sunday, 25 November, we welcomed and hosted an enjoyable buffet dinner for over 40 young Italian arts students and their tutors from the Accademia di Belle Arti Di Brera, Milano. In all, close to 100 persons attended this function. At the beginning of December the 9<sup>th</sup> annual senior Christmas luncheon was held, with eighty four members attending. The following week Father Christmas made his annual trip to the club with his sack of gifts for the forty children who came to the children's Christmas party. During the second week of February the club's annual 2 day bus trip took place ~ this year's destination was Rotorua. The forty three people who went on this trip certainly had a wonderful time.

Once again, we were blessed with a fine day for the annual picnic in February, and encouraged by the many new faces amongst the 150 people who attended. Moreover, this year's Italian festival, the 14<sup>th</sup>, proved to be very popular and just as successful as in previous years, even though we were competing with four other high profile events in Wellington City on the same day. We, italo-neozelandese have certainly made our mark in today's society!

The second stage of the club refurbishment is about to start ... that is, the interior walls of the clubrooms will be painted/wallpapered and the area around the toilets lightened up. A third of the height of the exterior wall alongside the car park area has been plastered in preparation to be painted with anti-graffiti paint.

As everybody knows, with accomplishment, there is always a strong team working behind the scenes. I would like to sincerely thank these people, bearing in mind that the members of the executive committee and all those members who help in whatever way, give of their time willingly and voluntarily.

# **REPORT FROM CLUB GARIBALDI'S BUILDING MANAGER**

From the outcome of a meeting I had with our qualified master plumber, the following was revealed.

When Club Garibaldi was first built, it was a council law to have 3 reserve tanks up on the roof, one tank for each floor to supply water to toilets, hot water tank and general. The idea was in case the water was cut off from the mains, the building would have water in it's tanks. Around the perimeter of the tanks there were holes in which rainwater was seeping through, thus flooding the kitchen area. It has now been fixed by putting flashing around it. When the new roof was installed, obviously it was decided to cut around the tanks, therefore under the tanks lies the old holes and rusty roof.

We are now having a tray made so that the tanks will sit in these trays thus eliminating any possible flooding in the future. To get rid of the tanks as suggested by some members, would not be financially feasible as the cost would be well over \$100.000. Firstly, the tanks will have to be removed either by a crane or helicopter, then new iron to cover holes left by the removal of the tanks. Applying to the council for a permit to remove the tanks, providing that the council will agree, digging up the footpath to feed pipes through would be necessary. Also, new pipes right through the building will be needed s well as new hot water tanks because of the change from low pressure to high pressure.

I hope this answers your questions. If anyone wants to know more please contact me.

My suggestion is that we leave this matter as per our discussion at the AGM
