A BIT OF TRIVIA

Chubby Beauty: DomPost, 3 August 2010

Forget those pencil-thin model types – Italy has chosen a full-figured woman as its new beauty queen, weighing in at a hefty 170kg. Angela Scognamiglio said she was 'very moved' when she was named the new 'Miss Chubby' at the complex-free contest held in the Tuscany village of Forcoli, near the city of Pisa. "I feel as if I've won the lottery", the 33 year old from Naples said. As in all past 20 years of the pageant, there is only one condition for entry: you have to weigh more than 100 kilograms. No big prize for the winner, just a huge cake to share!

BOMBONIERE

Bomboniere (Italian), sugared almonds or confetti are known as 'favours' ~ gifts given out to guests on special occasions such as weddings, First Communion or Confirmation. The tradition of distributing wedding favours is an ancient one. It is believed that the first wedding favour, common amongst European aristocrats, was known as a bonbonniere – a small trinket box made of crystal, porcelain, and/or precious stones. The contents of these precious boxes were generally sugar cubes or delicate confections, which symbolized wealth and royalty. Some centuries later bonbonnières were replaced with almonds which were distributed to wedding guests to signify well wishes on the bridegroom's new life! In the thirteen century, almonds coated with sugar, known as confetti, were introduced. Confetti soon transformed to sugared almonds, which later evolved into the favour for modern day weddings.

Traditionally at weddings, five sugared almonds are presented in a confection box, or wrapped in elegant fabric, which symbolize health, wealth, happiness, fertility and long life, that is part of the life of the new couple. The bitterness of the almond and the sweetness of the coated candy represents the bitter sweetness of a marriage. Tradition calls for the bridal couple to walk amidst the tables at the wedding reception, after the cake has been cut. The groom holds a silver tray with the confetti and the bride offers them to guests – always distributing an odd number.

Sugared almonds come in assorted colours: white for wedding, First Communion or Confirmation, pink or light-blue for the baptism of baby girl or baby boy, and respectively, silver or gold for 25 or 50 wedding anniversaries. A small card printed with the data of the ceremony (names, date etc) is often attached to the bomboniere.

A traditional bomboniere poem

*Five sugared almonds for each guest to eat
To remind us that life is both bitter and sweet.
Five wishes for the new husband and wife –
Health, wealth, happiness, Children and a long life.*

I understand that the book was written by an Italian who had been in New Zealand for ages, married to a New Zealander and they lived in Christchurch. However, he was interned on Matiu/Somes because he was Italian. He wrote about the seagulls around the island and him watching them as it was the only thing he was allowed to put in letters to his wife: any mention of weather or shipping being prohibited on security grounds. My friend remembers hearing about this book whilst listening to the National Programme in the 1990's - probably after about 1993. HAPPY 70 YEARS YOUNG!



Happy belated birthday greetings to Antonio (Maverick) Esposito of Island Bay, who has reached the wonderful milestone of 70 years young! Buon compleanno Antonio, Club Garibaldi wish you many more happy and healthy years to come.

I recently spent a very pleasant afternoon with Tony and Carolina and want to share some of the topics Tony and I chatted about. Tony left his home in Massalubrense in late November 1959, arriving in New Zealand on 20 January 1960, at 20 years of age, to avoid doing the compulsory army conscription! Tony said that he did not have one cent in his pocket for the 'beginning of his new life on the other side of the world' and his 40 day sea voyage, so his compare, who accompanied him from Massalubrense to the Port of Naples, gave him

10,000 lira, which Tony said was a lot of money in those days, to tie him over until he got a job!

One vivid memory he has is that a short time after his arrival, Tony, naturally, wanted to sought out fellow Italians, so he took himself to Club Garibaldi, at the old Wakefield Street premises, only to initially be turned away, as he was not a club member: however, a senior relative vouched for him and Tony was allowed entry, then promptly became an active member! Quite a different situation today as Italian visitors from the four corners of the world, are warmly welcomed! See the next article for an example.

Tony said he thoroughly enjoyed the monthly dances and always counted the days to them – in his words 'they were fantastic!' The clubrooms were always full to capacity, everybody mingled and had lots of fun. Tony danced every dance; and it didn't matter to him whether his dancing partner was young or old!

Tony also recalls the great picnics that Florio Zandi, Club President at that time, would hold for Club members every summer on his property in Tawa, where the bucket tree is. Yet another good memory was when he played his first game of bowls at the Club. He played so well that he shocked the older bowlers who did not believe he had not played the game before – obviously he was a natural!

A WARM WELCOME

The following is an example of Italian visitors welcomed to the Club: At a Sunday shared lunch earlier this year, two men came in off the street – said they had seen the Club Garibaldi sign on the outside wall and because they were Italian, thought they would come up and see what was happening as they'd heard voices! I introduced myself and welcomed them in – they said they were back-packing around New Zealand and had not met any Italians! As we were about to have lunch I invited them to join us – they shyly declined, but with a little persuasion they stayed – in their words 'but only for 10 minutes'! They stayed all day! As conversation flowed the men said they were carabinieri from Puglia and Rome, and this was their first visit to New Zealand. *Ginette*

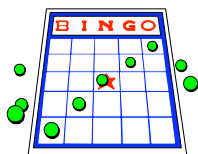
CIRCOLO ITALIANO – SEPTEMBER SOCIAL
