Vespa Celebrates 60th Birthday

The legendary Italian motor scooter Vespa, recently celebrated its 60th birthday with a big party and the unveiling of three new models at Vespa's headquarters. At the same time, a presentation of a project to build a new Vespa Museum was unveiled by well known architect Massimiliano Fuksas. Vespa's actual birthday was on 23 April 1946, and registered in Florence by Piaggio & Company.

After World War 2, Enrico Piaggio, and Corradino D'Ascanio, an aircraft designer by trade, came up with the idea of producing a cheap, small-engine bike with its gear shift on the handle bar and the motor over the back wheel. This was then covered in a steel cowling which gave the scooter its distinctive shape that made it look like a wasp, which in Italian is vespa.

The scooter was an immediate success, acting as the proto-type for all scooters to follow. By 1949, over 35,000 scooters were produced and by the mid-50's Piaggio was producing the Vespa in Britain, Germany, France, Belgium, Spain, Indonesia and India. In Britain the Vespa became a cultural icon and in the early 1960's it was the preferred transportation for the young people who called themselves 'Mods', compared to the 'Rockers' who rode motor cycles.

The Vespa was used in the 1953 film 'Roman Holiday', in which Gregory Peck portrays journalist who gives princess-in-disguise Audrey Hepburn, a tour of the Italian capital on the back of his Vespa.

After losing ground to Japanese competitors, the Vespa has made a major come-back over the last five years, thanks to the introduction of new models which are easier to drive and more environmentally friendly. This re-opened the door to the lucrative United States market, where they had been banned since the 1980's because of the poor emissions ratings.

Over 120 different Vespa models have been produced since 1946 and more than 16 million scooters have been sold.

Glimpse into ~~~ Casalvecchio Siculo, Messina

This month Casalvecchio Siculo is featured, the area where my paternal grandfather, Antonino Toscano was born.

to several family names of the area.

I would like to share with you a little about the time I spent in Casalvecchio which sits high up in the mountains, a short distance from the city of Messina. This visit was very emotional for me. The village is of Greek Byzantine origin, circa 1351, and has fantastic panoramic views. Robin and I were made to feel most welcome, especially when word spread (very quickly) that I was a descendent with links

Today, there are approximately 1,200 inhabitants, compared to nearly 5,000 around 80 years ago. Their devotion to Sant'Onofrio Anacoreta, patron saint of the area, is very strong! We were able to participate in the festival celebrations in his honour and witnessed centuries old traditions. Once a year, for one week only, the silver statue of Sant'Onofrio, who protected the local population from the plague in Sicily in 1347, and made in 1745 by Giuseppe Arico from Messina, is displayed on the side of the high altar in

the Baroque style 17th century church. Hundreds of people of all ages from neighbouring villages came to join the locals, to pay homage ...

It was incredible watching everybody, including teenagers and young adults, kissing their hands, then placing them on Sant'Onofrio's feet, as he was mounted on a high pedestal. This motion was always repeated three times in succession.

Another wonderful experience was the arrival of 'u camiddu', which means a camel. It is actually a giant frame in the shape of a camel, its body draped in red cloth, except for the long neck and face, and manipulated by two young men, lead by an older man in traditional Sicilian dress. The camel trotted up and down, through the village streets, 'snapping' its huge mouth at the bystanders in jest... their excitement was infectious! As a sign of respect for elderly townsfolk, especially to those sitting on benches, u camiddu would kneel briefly on its two front legs, allowing the people to stroke his neck, before standing to chase the youngsters around! This enactment symbolises the villagers' liberation from tyranny under the House of Savoca, which began in early 1700.

The next evening, just prior to carnival time, a full procession took place along the main village street, from one end to the other. Eight men, carried the statue of Sant'Onofrio on a platform, on their shoulders, which was decorated with flowers and candles, while the on lookers sang hymns and psalms.

At midnight, thousands crowd the streets waiting for the Sciccareddu – which means 'the donkey' to appear!

First, six young men cleared a pathway by spraying a gushing shower of sparkling fireworks at the bystanders who quickly jumped out of their way! Then a man appeared, wearing an iron frame in the shape of a huge donkey with firecrackers attached every few inches. With a flick of a switch fireworks commenced – green, white and red tracers, attached to wheels turned and spun with the pressure of the crackers! U sciccareddu chased anyone in his path, crowds screamed to get out of the way of flinging fireworks and rockets which fired up into the dark skies.

The finale came when u sciccareddu bowed down at the feet of the statue of Sant'Onofrio on the church steps....a spectacular sight! Sant'Onofrio was then carried back into the Church followed by hundreds of people singing and paying their last respects, before he was gently encased and stored away for another year.
