


New Members

The farmer agreed to deliver the donkey the next day. The next day he drove up saying, 'Sorry son, but I have some bad news, the donkey died.'



The Digital Archive of Documents on Italian Immigration in New Zealand (Archivio Digitale Documenti sull'Immigrazione Italiana in Nuova Zelanda) is looking for photos from Italian families and their descendants in NZ, preferably any year up to the 1980s.

The aim is to enrich the archive with historical personal records of the Italian presence in New Zealand, both from immigrants and Italians who have lived and left a mark in this country. Relevant photos will be included in the archive for public reference, and can be emailed to info.addiinz@gmail.com or alessandra@oratia.co.nz with a caption including description and names, date, location, occasion (i.e. wedding, family photo etc.) and photographer (if known).

About the Archive

In 2016 Com.It.Es. Wellington launched a project to research and collect the existing sources of information about Italian migration and presence in New Zealand. Thanks to funds from the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and International Cooperation (MAECI), and the help of volunteers, the project materialised into a website and online archive: Archivio Digitale Documenti sull'Immigrazione Italiana in Nuova Zelanda (ADDIINZ).

Today the archive is hosted and paid for by the Società Dante Alighieri Auckland and administered by volunteers as a free, public, and not-for-profit resource. Entries are divided into six categories: Books & Theses, Articles, Videos & Documentaries, Interviews, Websites, and Other (which includes photos). Each single entry has a short synopsis, with links to online resources or to the location of the documented material (libraries, archives, universities, etc). When available, each page also lists other resources on the same topic. At present the main language of the archive is English, like much of the resources catalogued so far. For resources in the Italian language a synopsis is provided in both English and Italian.


