'A DAY IN POMPEII' EXHIBITION AT TE PAPA

February 14 was a busy day for members who enjoyed 'things Italian', while some of us were at the Blessing of the Boats at Island Bay others of us were at Te Papa 'spending an afternoon with Lavinia' and having coffee while enjoying our own Mediterranean Trio.

The photo on the next page shows member Letizia Columbano-Green, along with Raffaella Delmonte from Auckland and Luca Quaglia at the event *AN AFTERNOON WITH LAVINIA*. They gave us an insight into a day in the life of Lavinia, a woman from Pompeii as she shopped at a Pompeii market, planned and prepared a feast for her wedding. 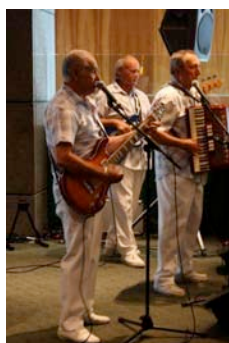
AN AFTERNOON WITH LAVINIA



A play with drama, laughs and lots of information on the life of two Patrician sisters in Pompeii before 24 August 79AD. Lucius, a young student of Tacitus will take you back to the time, a few days before the eruption when Lavinia with her sister Iulia are preparing all the necessary steps for her wedding: the decision of an extravagant menu with exotic ingredients and their preparation; the decoration of the atrium; Iulia medicinal garden with the special corner dedicated to the "poison plants"; the father's special guest arriving in the evening (a well-known foodie writer).

As the two sisters leave the Vetti's Domus (house) to go shopping Lucius gives a talk about the Roman calendar, the "*dies fasti* and *dies nefasti*", the importance to venerate the god Vulcanus (the god of fire) on 23 August and the Lares (the gods who protect the house).

Lavinia is at the market choosing the necessary ingredients for the dinner, talking about the best way to preserve food and giving some of the recipes...they then go to Via Dell'Abbondanza to choose the perfect material for Lavinia's wedding *velarium flammeum* and her father's purple colour toga...but with all the talking the two sisters forget to buy the live fish to honour the god, Vulcanus...an omen? Is it possible that if more of the inhabitants remembered on the 23rd to offer live fish as a sacrifice that it would have prevented the city from taking the brunt of the powerful fury of the volcano the following day?

Julie Biuso first went to Italy in 1975, traveling by ship from Auckland, stopping briefly in Naples, then docking in Genova but something drew her back to Naples. Whether it was the contrast between the stoic women dressed top to toe in black in the scorching heat of summer and the joy of cheeky, colourful ragamuffin children playing soccer on the streets or the daring of suave dark-eyed Italian boys pinching bottoms undeterred that intrigued her, or the general swagger of the place, the hordes going this way and that, the incessant cacophony of horns beeping, Vespas roaring, zigzagging through the mass like ants, the rich, the poor, mingling together along crumbling cobblestoned streets, stalls of food, mounds of rubbish, noise, rush and heat, and all this under the watchful eye of Mt. Vesuvius, Naples got to her. It was here she discovered the simple tastes of Neapolitan cuisine; tomatoes that tasted of sunshine, buffalo mozzarella cheese that ran like a river over puffed and blistered crusts of pizza dough, the scent of basil wafting through the streets of Naples, and at its heart, Pompeii.

Join Julie Biuso as she reads from letters she wrote to her family during her travels through Italy nearly 35 years ago, sharing her stories which reveal her hopes and aspirations at the time and her culinary awakening. She will re-live the day spent at Pompeii, a day unlike any other where the phrase *Vedi Napoli e poi muori* had real reason to ring in her ears.
